### DYNAMITED CAVE NOWLOCKED

Under the terms of the Special Use Permit for Dynamited Cave, a chain and padlock was recently installed at the cave entrance. One key is in the custody of the District Ranger at Cook, Washington, the other in the custody of Bill Halliday. This is in accord with the terms of the permit. The padlock would have been installed last autumn but weather did not permit.

Other Northwestern speleological groups which are willing to adhere to the very reasonable terms of the permit will have no difficulty in obtaining access. The Oregon Grotto has been written about such arrangements, but has not yet replied.

Dear Dr. Halliday:

Enclosed is a special use permit for exploration work in the Dynamited Cave on the Willard Ranger District.

Please read the permit carefully and particularly the special clauses 18 through 26. You will note that item 20 requires that the Society provide the District Ranger with an accomplishment report and a work plan for each year. In this way, the Forest Service will have knowledge of what is being accomplished in the permit area. Clause \$26 was added since we discussed the permit with you recently. Considering the care with which you fellows packed out all litter and residue from carbide lamps during our trip into the cave, it may seem that this clause is unneeded. This could become a problem, however, and we thought it advisable to put it into the permit, since others may be using the cave from time to time.

We enjoyed the trip into the cave very much. It was a very educational trip for us and would not have been possible without the equipment and experience that you fellows provided. We will look forward to getting together with your group in the future and hope that you will be able to help us on studies for other caves in the area. If you have any questions regarding the permit please feel free to write any time.

9. The permittee shall fully repair all damage, other than ordinary wear and tear, to national forest

roads and trails caused by the permittee in the exercise of the privilege granted by this permit.

10. No Member of or Delegate to Congress or Resident Commission - shall be admitted to any share or part of this agreement or to any beneft that may arise herefrom unless it is made with a corporation for

The temporary use and occupancy of the premises and improvements herein described may be sublet by the permittee to third parties only with the prior written approval of the forest supervisor but the permittee shall continue to be responsible for compliance with all conditions of this permit by persons to whom such premises may be sublet.

15. This permit may be terminated upon breach of any of the conditions herein or at the discretion of

the regional forester or the Chief, Forest Service.

16. In the event of any conflict between any of the preceding printed clauses or any provision thereof and any of the following clauses or any provisions thereof, the preceding printed clauses will control. 17. - The permittee has the exclusive right to conduct speleological studies and shall cooperate with other cave research agencies in exploration of the cave to the extent that it will not jeopardize the permittee's study.
- Though the general public may be excluded from the special use area, the Forest Service shall have access to the extent satisfactory to the District Ranger.
- The permitee shall, prior to February first of each year, submit a progress report to the District Ranger outlining the studies completed during the preceding year, the studies in progress, and the results of consequence during the preceding year. Prior to June first of each year, a plan for the work to be accomplished during the current year will be submitted to the District Ranger.
- 21. Any alteration of the special use area or any alteration in the cave itself which will change its original physical appearance or otherwise affect its future development or management must be approved in advance in writing by the Forest Service.
- 22. Unless sooner terminated or revoked, this permit will expire December 31, 1970. At that time, if the conditions of this special use have been met, the Forest Supervisor may extend the permit for an additional period, the length of which to be decided upon at the time. The permit may also be terminated at such time as the Forest Service is ready to develop and manage the cave for public use.
- 23. Signs or other improvements necessary for the conduct of this study shall be approved by the District Ranger.
- The permittee shall indemnify the United States against any liability for damage to life or property arising from the occupancy and use of National Forest lands under this permit, by the permittee, his employees, contractors, associates, or guests; Provided, this shall not be construed to indemnify the United States against its own negligence.
- 25. The permittee shall construct a locked entrance to the cave and shall furnish the Forest Service with a key.
- 26. The permittee shall pack out all litter, residue from carbide lamps, etc, which result from exploration of the cave.

The Cave Pigs reported at the August meeting that on August 1st, the little limestone grotto at the south end of the Red Cave trench was impressive with ice spelecthems.

Verne Frese thought he found an ice wall deep in Danger Cave, but it turned out to be calcite. Bill Halliday mentiones re-solution in that area.

Verne brought the old French film SPELUNKING - A NEW SCIENCE to the meeting from the Seattle Public Library. It's old, badly worn and often spliced, and some of the techniques now seem ludicrous, but it's still a good movie

On the August 1st trip, no water was running out of Clark's Caue, but the intrance was siphoned.

# NEW KARST AREA DISCOVERED ON CAVE RIDGE by Bill Halliday

Scouting the south and west sides of Cave Ridge Sunday August 22nd, while Vern Frese's t am was mapping Hellhole, I found a new karst area in the flatjust nor h of the saddle between Cave Ridge and Guye Peak. It is crossed by the trail leading north along the ridge line, and it is a mystery to me why no one else has recorded it. Looking down from the west side of the flats up on top, the area ppears white in contrast to the dark rock of the rest of the area. We look d into more than a dozen sinkholes, some of them very active, but found none enterable without digging. Clearly there are caves underneath.

Incidentally, coming back down from Cave Ridge, we found a sinkhole southeast of Danger Cave with a cool breeze coming from it intermittently. We moved some rocks, but again would have had to dig.. This may connect only to the rear of Danger Cave, however, though the latter should be more than 100 feet lower at that point.

Oh, yes. About the mapping.....

By the time Ross, Pat and I got there, Hellhole was almost mapped. Then the fun started. Vern still thought the map was 180 degrees out of phase. I went down part way to check. I thought it wasn't. Vern went back down all the way. He still thought it was: "This is north, isn't it?" he said, pointing due south. I don't know if he's convinced even yet. That 180 degree turn going through the entrance is a confuser, all tight.

The big sinkhole south of the entrance turned out to be over the right side passage, not the main room, which leads southeast.

When we left, Vern's crew was busily mapping the positions of the various entrances. Good Work!

And I'm almost sold on thos ascenders, though they need practice.

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MORE WORK DONE ON RAILROAD TRACK, ARCH, AND LAVA SPRING CAVES

On August 28th and 29th, a small party photographed Railroad Track, Arch, and Lava Springs Caves, in the upper St. Helens flow. The pit which previously had blocked exploration in the upper end of Arch Cave was bypassed - nothing tremendous was found except some fine red and black flows and some red opal dripstone. Surprise Cave was also re-explored. Next morning the party did some Brunton mapping in the entrance section upper levels of Dynamited Cave. On the same weekend, Don Dilley had a separate small party in the upper section of Ape Cave.

If any caver has seen anything like this in caves in the past, or any grotto or NSS member desires more information, write or contact Hondo Rescue, 137 Girard Place, Kirkwood, Mo. If these were not times when lawlessness by the extreme left were not condoned by the national administration, thus automaticly leading to lawlessness by the extreme right, this would seem absurd. As it is, it is difficult to tell if this is a hoax or if authorities are more concerned about the actual possibility of an armed insurection than they have been willing to tell the public. We hope for clarification soon.

AND WHILE WE'RE ON THE SUBJECT, WHAT ABOUT THOSE CUBAN CAVES THE ADMINISTRATION IS SO DILIGENTLY IGNORING???

We wonder about this particularly since Hondo Rescue recently indicated that the caver (non-NSS) rescued from Neff Canyon Cave, Utah, had later died of exposure. Dale Green of the Salt Lake Grotto, assures us that this is not the case: "I know for a fact he was alive and kicking several days after that (June 7th)," and "dictated an article for his local paper on August 7 th".

REPORT ON THE 1965 N.S.S. CONVENTION by Bill Halliday

It was quite a convention. Almost 500 registered - biggest ever. I go to the conventions to go caving, and can't report too much on the proceedings. But all who did seemed well pleased. Particularly important were two sessions on vertical caving - wish every Cascade Grotto member could have heard those. I have a pamphlet distributed there for reference of those interested.

I got to Indianapolis Friday night well ahead of the convention - the Central Indiana Grotto provided fine hospitality (we mailed the CIG Newsletter - shades of the Caver!). (Ed note. Humph) After a morning in the local libraries, ON TO KENTUCKY!

But it was Saturday and everything in Louisville was closed. Except the Louisville Free Public Library, which proved a rich source. Then on the Mammoth Cavel

......by way of Mammoth Onyx Cave, an intimate and pretty little commercial cave en route, run by Bob Pohl of Flint Ridge fame.

Next day, the all-day tour in Mammoth Cave, said by the guides to be seven miles. With about 80 tourists in the party, we made it in 5 3/4 hours including lunch and frequent rest stops, so I doubt it. With the historic section at the main entrance and thr pretty part at the New Entrance, the Scenic Tour would have been better - but I suppose every caver ought to make the Long Route once.

# Convention Report (continued)

It was such a pleasant, easy trip, in fact, that I went through nearby Diamond and Short Caves that evening with Woody, son of the proprieter of Diamond Cave, another nearby pleasant, pretty, short cave. There may be big news of Short Cave sometime soon; at the moment, things are in the confidential state.

Next morning, on to James and Hundred Dome Caves, joint commercializations by a new resort: both interesting and impressive and quite different but not as speleothemic as Diamond and Mammoth Onyx. Hundred Dome is junt that - fantastic domepits everywhere.

Back to Louisville and libraries...and libraries, and Frankfort.....and libraries, and Lexington....and a library.....and on to Bloomington via a 40-mile midnight detour. That was quite a day. In fact, the more I think about it, somewhere along here I ended up taking the grand tour of Wyandotte Cave in southwestern Indiana with the nonpareil, Lewis Lamon: the trip to the fantastic Pillar of the Constitution, a huge red-brown stalagmite atop a long black slope in a huge chamber entered impressively through a tight squeezeway. Wyandotte is a wilderness commercial cave; no lights or improvements; big and delightful. We found a name with a 1809 date, perhaps a new record - though some at the convention thought they knew where to find the 1807 signature of President (then Govenor) Harrison which predates any written record of the cave - if it is any nore than myth.
