#### RECENT EVENTS

The biggest recent event for the grotto was the trip to the Summit Steam Caves of Mt. Rainier -- eight years after the only other successful climb by the Seattle contingent, and four years after the last visit by Gene Kiver's team. Major changes were found in both the main crater and the east crater. The Lake Passage was blocked but a huge room was found at the south end of the west crater system. The Perimeter Passage was found blocked at about its mid-point in the main crater but a new lower room was found straight down the slope from the trailside entrances at the south rim. Participating were Chuck Coughlin, Roger Cox, Roger and Zella Matthews, and Patricia Halliday and this temporary editor.

## Vulcanospeleological Abstract

Grottes et Tunnels de Lava du Mont Cameroun, by Bernard Geze. Spelunca, Bulletin de la Soc. Speleol. de France. Vol. 10, 1939-43, pp. 1-7.

On Mount Cameroun in west Africa, "canals" ('canaux') of lava are common but lava tubes and caves were thought to be rare. Some were known before Geze's 1939 visit. He discovered others, and concluded that a methodological investigation would reveal a large number. He found hornitos a guide to their presence. The longest (which he discovere) is la grotte Gaskin, 180 m long. Despite the small size of these caves and the shortness of the paper, the keenness of Geze's observations make this a significant paper, in both geology and biology. It should be reviewed in its entirety by anyone concerned with vulcanospeleology and its pioneers.
