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# **Biological Timing Guide**

Mark Perkins has compiled a list of local caves and arranged them into lists according to the impact that visiting them has on bats and other inhabitants. His lists are published in *The Speleograph* (Oregon Grotto), April 1989, Page 43, but he disclaims any endorsement of his recommendations by the Oregon Grotto. This information, says Perkins, is for trip planning and does not represent proposed regulations. Likewise, I am reprinting them here for consideration in trip planning and not to im, ly any policy of the Cascade Grotto or the Cascade Caver.

Perkins does not clearly explain the reasoning behind his lists so some contrary opinions may be forthcoming from grotto members but discussion may lead to a better understanding of our caves among a wider number of cavers. Note that caves in Oregon were omitted from this reprint. The following is what I have deduced about the lists.

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Survey Class Final Exam ......

- Numbers in parentheses appear to be the number of caves in a system.
- Open year round: Bats are not known to use these caves.
- Avoid in winter: Presumably because bats do use these caves.
- · Avoid in summer: No reason given.
- Electric lights recommended: Recommended over carbide to avoid carbide spills and dumps that are poisonous to the invertebrates who inhabit the caves.
- Photograph bats: Caves were selected because they are believed to usually contain one or two bats to photograph but presumably seldom more than one or two bats to be disturbed.

Mount Adams: Back Bone, Big Trench, COG, Davids Den Annex, Goose, Ice Rink Annex, Jug (east tube), Madisons Fence, Poachers, Christmas Tree

#### Caves to avoid in Summer

Mount St. Helens: Power Line.

Mount Adams: Christmas Tree, Poachers, Big.

Wind River: Curly Creek.

#### Caves where electric lights are recommended

Mount St. Helens: Little Red River, Lake (in Spring).

Wind River: Three Sinks, Datus Perry New Cave,

Mount Adams: Deadhorse, Pond II, Slime (in winter)

#### Caves to photograph bats

Mount Adams: Dots, Dry Creek, Dead Bear

Wind River: Falls Creek Annex

Letter from Dr. Halliday, Jan 16 1991: I hope you are all dried out by now, or at least have you nares above the floods. Inclosed is a Christmas letter I recently received from Dana Lee (more likely written by his daughter). Dana is truly one of the grand old men of pioneer American caving, as amply demonstrated in the Journal of Spelean History and my own still-forthcoming photo history of Carlsbad Cavern. Last time I visited him, which was last year, his mind was still sharp as a tack with an IQ somewhere around 160 and excellent recall for he early days at Carlsbad. But his eyesight was about gone and his hearing a bit impaired. Now he has to have round-the-clock care, which must be terribly depressing for someone so active for 85 years or so. I know that some years ago some of the grotto visited him but it is hard to keep visits going under such circumstances. Still, it would be great if some of the grotto could go see him sometimes and he will be glad, very glad to tell them about the 1920's at Carlsbad. ### Kelly's Cave A Leadership Puzzler

You are leading a group of 5 experienced cavers in a trip through Kelly's Cave, a medium-sized cave with a 50-foot drop and a 70-ft drop. Each drop is narrow, with walls in easy reach of a rappelling person throughout its length. The fissures are rigged with separate ropes. Because there are few stopping points between the drops, the customary routine is for a caver to complete both drops before another descends the first drop.

About 15 feet below the second lip, the third caver, Colin, rappelling on a 6-bar rack employing a "spelean shunt" safety, gets distracted and runs his heavy shirt tail well into his rack.

He has his ascending gear, including a double bungi Gibbs system, chest harness with a Gosset box, a couple of Prusik slings, and an etrier with him, but

no knife aboard. Seth is stationed at the top of the second drop; two cavers await at the bottom of the second drop, while you and another caver remain at the top of the first drop. What do you do?

Notice of vote on proposed changes to Grotto Constitution and Bylaws

The following amendments have been proposed and will be voted on at the next grotto business Meeting which will be held on May 17, following the regular grotto meeting. Grotto business meetings are open to all members

The dues increase was approved at the January business meeting as announced but the change involved the Bylaws and due notice was not given. A complete copy of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Operating Policy was published in the January-February 1991 Cascade Caver. Changes to the Operating Policy will also be discussed and voted on during the May meeting. Proposed additions are shown underlined and deletions are struck out.

#### Constitution:

Paragraph V., Section 1: Membership is open to all persons in the Pacific Northwest interested in the grotto's purposes, who have complied with conditions of membership set forth in the Bylaws.

**Bylaws:** 

Article I., Section 2: Household members are relatives of a regular member, live at the same address as a regular member, and have paid current dues.

Article II: All grotto dues shall be paid at the time of beginning membership and shall be renewable one year later. Dues for regular and associate members shall be \$7.50 \$10.00 per year. Subscription rate for grotto publications shall be \$7.56 \$10.00 for one year's issues. Dues for household members shall be \$1.50 \$2.00 per year. ## Meeting notes


The turnout at the March 15 Grotto meeting was great! There were new faces as well as faces we don't see very often.

# Survey Class Final Exam


Get out your protractor, ruler, and three sharpened pencils. Put your name in the upper right-hand corner and don't begin until I say "GO". The person who can survey their way out in the least amount of time and achieves the smallest closure error wins.



How fast can you exit this cave? To get out you must chimney up domes and down pits from one level to another. All pits lead to a lower level, all domes to an upper level, but don't leave these four levels. Check your compass! You could get lost.


