

# Evolution in the Absence of Light

One of my classes here at the UW is Biological Anthropology. While my professor (David P. Tracer) was talking about Evolution and Natural Selection and genes and all that stuff, I started wondering how cave organisms could possibly evolve without skin pigmentation. I e-mailed him and asked him that question, and for those of you who are interested, here is the response he gave me.

## Mike,

Great question. There have been two proposals that I'm aware of to explain this phenomenon. One revolves around the concept of "somatic budget". Basically organisms have a pool of energy reserves that they can partition for different uses including growth and reproduction, and within "growth" to different organ systems. Given that energy nearly always seems to be a scarce resource in nature, it is advantageous to organisms to use their budgets wisely - that is, to devote the minimum amount possible to growth of various systems and the rest to reproduction. If there is a cost to synthesizing melanin pigment, which there undoubtedly is, then organisms living in an environment where melanin gives no advantage would do best to forgo its production and channel their energy into other systems or perhaps reproduction. So if there is variability among organisms in melanin production (which again there undoubtedly is) then all else being equal "synthesizers" should be at a disadvantage relative to organisms who don't synthesize it and instead channel energy into characteristics that have true utility.

An alternative explanation, and one that is by no means as accepted as the first, was proposed by C. Loring Brace at UMichigan and is called "probable mutation effect". Brace argues that mutations, most of which impair protein production or function, occur all the time albeit at a slow rate. Many of these are not seen because they are at least somewhat harmful, and are selected out. However Brace argues that when selection for maintenance of a particular character is relaxed, that gives opportunity for mutations to creep in and be maintained. So he argues that the lack of pigmentation in cave dwelling creatures is the result of mutations which impaired pigment production (incidentally, this type of mutation is for some reason one of the most common in animals) and because there was no advantage or disadvantage to them (neither selection for or against

them), they were just perpetuated on. Again this theory is not well regarded but it's interesting nonetheless.

Windy Creek Cave Trip Report -September 9, 1995

I'm rather embarrassed to say this, but after caving for 20 years here in the Northwest, I had never made it to Windy Creek Cave. There was always something going on whenever there was a trip scheduled. When I was cleaning up a bunch of mail at home, I found a copy of the Caver and saw that Gerry Thompson was going to lead a trip to the cave on September 9th (about 10 days away). I immediately marked the date on the calendar so my wife couldn't schedule me for something else and got hold of Gerry to see if the trip was still going.

Lane Holdcroft and I met Gerry & Richard Walters, Mike Jones (4th Corner Grotto), and Dave Eck from Oregon, near Concrete where we all piled into Gerry's van and headed up the road. The road is all on Crown Pacific Land and they have it gated twice, only one of which we were able to get the combination for.

It took us a little over 2 hours to make the hike to the cave. Since Gerry was the only member of the party to have been there before, he gave everyone a guided tour, pointing out all the large sinks and the other small caves in the area. For those that haven't been there before, the cave is quiet extensive (by Washington standards) with over 3,000 feet of passage. We attempted to sign in at the register, but couldn't open the stupid box. (We brought it out of the cave on our return and finally managed to get it open. We were the first group to have signed it since 9/93, which means either nobody has been there, they didn't bother to sign in or they couldn't open the container either.) After the mud bath at the Ex-Pool and then the Boulevard Crawl the majority of the passage follows a pretty little stream, with the passage varying in width from about one to three feet.

We spent a little over an hour getting back to the Cairn Room. Dave, Lane and I then took turns snapping pictures while Gerry would lead the others out on a short little tour towards the Bear Pit. After about 30 or 40 minutes we started back out.

It took about 45 minutes to get back out with the only mishap being Gerry sticking his head in the mud at the Ex-Pool. He goes through it on his back and he wasn't going quite straight, so he got stuck. He then had to remove his helmet and he promptly planted his head right in the mud. After getting out, we had a little bite to eat and then headed back toward the car.

One of the real highlights of the trip (besides seeing a nice cave and meeting some interesting people) was seeing a big ol' black bear running down the hillside about 200 feet in front of us as we walked down the road. It was just the start of hunting season for grouse and bear so he was probably a little nervous.



There is also the "Cavers Digest" which is an E-mail newslist. It's sort of like a caving newsgroup except that all of the info is received via E-mail. About 10 pages of text are sent every couple of days. It takes some time to read but there's a lot of good information.

To get this file send the request to: *listproc@speleology.cs.yale.edu* On the first line of the body (not the subject line), type "help cavers-digest" (without the quotes).
